CULTIVATING GRATITUDE

I will give thanks to you, LORD, with all my heart; I will tell of all Your wonderful deeds. I will be glad and rejoice in You; I will sing the praises of your name, O Most High. My enemies turn back; they stumble and perish before You. For You have upheld my right and my cause, sitting enthroned as the righteous judge. You have rebuked the nations and destroyed the wicked; You have blotted out their name for ever and ever. Endless ruin has overtaken my enemies, You have uprooted their cities; even the memory of them has perished.

The LORD reigns forever; He has established His throne for judgment. He rules the world in righteousness and judges the peoples with equity. The LORD is a refuge for the oppressed, a stronghold in times of trouble. Those who know Your name trust in You, for You, LORD have never forsaken those who seek You.

Sing the praises of the LORD, enthroned in Zion; proclaim among the nations what He has done. For He who avenges blood remembers; He does not ignore the cries of the afflicted. *Psalm 9:1-12*

INSIGHT

In the original language of the Old Testament, Psalms 9 and 10 form what's called an acrostic poem. Each major thought or stanza begins with the next letter in the Hebrew alphabet. The Septuagint-the ancient Greek translation of the Old Testament— even combines Psalms 9 and 10 into one song, unifying the flow from beginning to end.

Acrostic poems and songs played an important function in ancient Israelite society. Because they were built on the alphabet, they were easy to remember. These two psalms of thanksgiving and help were designed to memorably remain in the minds of those who heard them. As a result, the reader or listener could quickly recall the message in the music. By rehearsing the words of David, they'd receive a regular injection of the importance of living a life of gratitude and dependence on God. Today, as we meditate on Scripture, may we also strive to cultivate an attitude of thanksgiving.

"Dad, can you get me some water?" my youngest daughter asked. "Sure," I said, bringing her a full cup. She took it wordlessly. Then my oldest daughter made the same request. She didn't respond either after I got her some water. Annoyed, I blurted out, "Is anyone going to say, 'Thank you'? Why is that so hard?"

Sometimes there's noting like parental frustration to open the door for God to work. Immediately I felt the gentle nudge of the Holy Spirit: *Yes Adam, why is it so hard to say, "Thank you"*? Busted. Turns out a lack of gratitude isn't just my kids' problem: it's mine, too.

I don't know why saying thank you can be so hard, but it certainly seems to be a part of the human condition. In the Psalms, however, we see a model for growing in gratitude. There, David and others often praise God amid myriad trials. And a particular phrase frequently precedes their thanksgiving: "I will..."

In Psalms 9:1, David deliberately chooses thankfulness: "I *will* give thanks to you, Lord, with all my heart; I *will* tell of all your wonderful deeds." We might be prone to think of gratitude primarily as a feeling. But David reminds us that it's also a *choice*.

Like David, as we choose to cultivate a *habit* of giving thanks, we can gradually grow to recognize and appreciate God's goodness in every aspect of life.

ADVENT - CHRISTMAS NEWS

THEME:

Our 2025 Advent-Christmas theme is: *What Child IS This...Beyond the Lullaby*. In 1865, William Chatterton Dix penned a poem that would become the beloved Christmas-time favorite, "What Child Is This?" During Advent, we will see the story of the time leading up to the birth of Christ in

"What Child Is This?" During Advent, we will see the story of the time leading up to the birth of Christ in its historical trauma-informed fullness. The story of humanity and its recurring themes of oppression and corruption run right through history and into our own stories. Yet, we can rely on the assurance of the carol to confirm that God is "present with us" in powerful ways that continue to be the Word of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love even and especially in the midst of hard times.

Friends, we live in troubled times... I have questions: How do I offer something that can address the complexities of our time? What is the Gospel Word to us as we worry about so many things? How do we struggle to be faithful witnesses to all the things we see unfolding all over this world of ours yet still proclaim the Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love of the season?" Beyond the Lullaby" could help us see into the difficulty of the socio-political-economic context that shaped the identity and story of the birth and life of Jesus. One of the most beloved carols we know, "What Child Is This?", asks and answers the question of Jesus' identity. The Good News is that God chose to enter our trauma-filled world in order to know us, tend to us, teach us how to be in these times. The "anchor image" (visual metaphor) for this series is the nativity scene, or créche. This worship series is meant to help us know more about who Jesus is by looking at the actual lives and circumstances of His story. And to see that God is also with us in our fragility, as we are to be with others. Advent is usually about waiting. But we cannot wait to have hope; it is essential now. We cannot wait to work for peace; lives are at stake. We cannot wait to embrace joy, even and especially when it seems in short supply. We cannot wait to love, most of all, because we are the ones who follow the saving love of Jesus Christ, God-With-Us.

DECORATIONS:

<u>Family Tree</u> – Both churches are inviting your family (no matter the size) to bring in an ornament for the tree in Fellowship Hall to represent your family... a **Church Family Tree**. It doesn't have to be fancy or homemade—just what you think represents you. Please bring it to the church <u>BEFORE</u> hanging of the Greens (11/23-SLF, 11/29-B) and put it on the table or cart in the gathering area.

<u>Creche Set/Nativities</u> — We are decorating the entire facility with nativity sets... if you have one or more nativities we can borrow for several weeks, please <u>LABEL</u> and bring to the church <u>before</u> the Hanging of the Greens dates. Place on the table or cart in the gathering area.

Advice from the Health Care Team Staying Healthy Through Flu Season

- 1. Stay home when you are sick.
- 2. Stay away from people who are sick.
- 3. Wash your hands frequently under warm water with soap for at least 20 seconds.



- 4. Create a clean environment. Flu germs live on surfaces for about 8 hours. Adding 2 TBSP vinegar in 16 oz water in spray bottle will kill the Flu virus.
- 5. Open windows 20-30 min. a day.
- 6. Flu viruses cannot live in high temperatures. Set dishwasher at highest setting during winter months. Use high dryer setting for bedding.
- 7. Use a humidifier. Flu viruses circulate less in humid environments.
- 8. Bolster your immune system.. Go outside! Sun exposes us to Vitamin D which helps with immune function.
- 9. Get a good night's sleep.
- 10. Drink plenty of water, exercise, maintain a well balanced diet.
